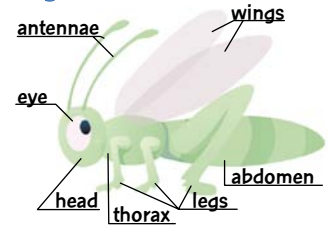

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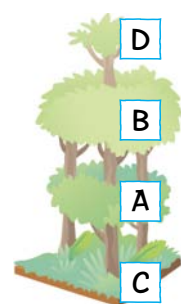

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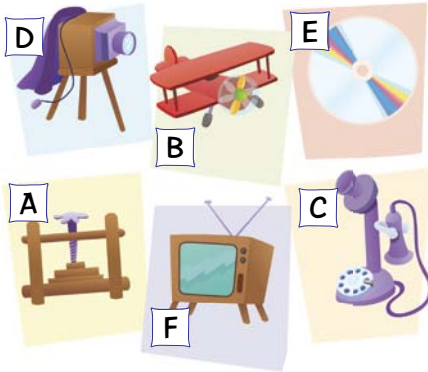

abdomen: the tail end of an insect.

allosaurus: a meat-eating dinosaur with big, curved teeth. It walked on two legs.

amateur: a sport played for pleasure rather than payment.

antennae: the feelers on the head of an insect.

apatosaurus: a huge, plant-eating dinosaur with a long neck and an arched back.

barnacle: a type of shellfish that attaches itself to boats, rocks, and other animals.

boccie: a game that is like lawn bowling.

brachiosaurus: a tall, plant-eating dinosaur with a long neck and a massive, sloping body.

camouflage: the act of hiding by means of disguise.

canopy: the top layer of rainforest trees.

capibara: the largest living rodent. It looks like a large guinea pig with no tail and webbed feet.

cartilage: the strong, elastic tissue that connects bones and forms human ears and noses.

castle: a fortified residence, usually for royalty or the wealthy in medieval times.

cathedral: a principal Christian church.

cello: a large string instrument that is played with a bow and rests on the ground.

cellophane: a clear plastic used as a food covering.

church: a building for Christian worship.

cicada: a type of insect that makes a loud, shrill sound.

clarinet: a wind instrument played by blowing across a reed in the mouthpiece.

cobra: a large, poisonous snake that spreads its skin like a hood when agitated.

cockroach: an insect with a flattened body that is a household pest.

cod: a type of fish found in the Atlantic Ocean.

cold-blooded: animals, such as reptiles and fish, whose body temperatures change according to their surroundings.

continental shelf: a shallow area of the ocean floor along the coast.

coral: a hard material made of the skeletons of tiny sea animals.

coral reef: a ridge of rocks and coral found mostly in warm and shallow tropical seas.

cotton gin: a machine for separating the cotton fibers from the seeds.

croquet: an outdoor game that uses mallets to hit wooden balls through wire hoops in the ground.

cuscus: a type of possum that is most active at night.

desert: an area that has very little rainfall.

dragonfly: a type of insect with two sets of wings and a long, slender body.

emergent trees: the very tall trees that grow above the top layer of a rainforest.

eoraptor: a small, meat-eating dinosaur that walked on two legs.
Everglades: a national park in Florida that is a subtropical wilderness.

extinct: refers to a type of animal or plant that has died out. None are living today.

fiction: an invented or imagined story about people and places that are not real.

floor: the dark ground of a rainforest.

flute: a wind instrument played by blowing across a hole at one end and covering holes to change the tones.

forest: an area covered with trees and underbrush, also called a woodland.

fossil: the remains of a plant or an animal from millions of years ago preserved as a rock.

gecko: a small tropical lizard that is usually active at night.

gong: a percussion instrument that is a metal disk that makes a hollow, echoing sound when struck.

grassland: an area where most of the vegetation is grasses, sometimes called a prairie.

guppy: a tiny freshwater fish that is a common pet.

habitat: a plant or animal's natural environment.

hadrosaur: common, duck-billed, plant-eating dinosaurs.

harp: a large, triangular string instrument that is played by plucking the strings.

heron: a type of bird that lives near water and has long, thin legs and a long beak.

invertebrate: an animal without a backbone.

jacana: a small tropical bird with long toes for walking on water plants.

katydid: a green insect resembling a grasshopper. The male rubs its front wings to make a shrill noise.

kelp: a large and edible type of brown seaweed.

Glossary

kingfisher: a small bird that lives near water and has bright feathers and a long bill.

lemur: a primate native to Madagascar that has a longish muzzle, large eyes, very soft fur, and a long, furry tail.

limpet: a type of sea animal with a protective shell. It clamps to rocks with a muscular foot.

luge: a one- or two-person sled for racing down a chute.

macaw: a large parrot with colorful feathers and a loud voice.

mandrill: a large baboon. The male has a ribbed blue and red face.

marmoset: a small monkey with a long tail.

marshland: an area with marshes, swamps, bogs, and other low, wet land.

mayfly: a type of insect with delicate wings.

mosque: a Muslim temple or place of worship.

mountain: an area with a much higher elevation than its surroundings.

museum: a building where works of art, scientific specimens, or other valuable objects are stored and displayed.

myna: a dark brown bird that can imitate the human voice.
Neolithic: the last period of the Stone Age.

nuthatch: a small bird with a short tail and a sharp beak.

oboe: a wind instrument played by blowing across a double reed in the mouthpiece.

okapi: a mammal that resembles a giraffe but with a much shorter neck and striped legs.

orangutan: a large ape with long, reddish-brown hair and long, strong arms.

organ: a keyboard instrument with one or more keyboards and pipes of different lengths.

ostrich: a very large, two-toed bird that does not fly.

pagoda: a temple or sacred building usually found in Asia.

paleontology: the study of fossils and ancient life forms, including dinosaurs.

papaya: a large, yellow, melonlike fruit.

phonograph: an instrument that uses a needle and a revolving disc to reproduce sounds.

piranha: a type of fish that eats other fish and sometimes larger animals that enter the water.

planetarium: a building that uses moving projectors to display stars, planets, and other visible objects in space.

plankton: tiny animals and plants that float in bodies of water.

platypus: an egg-laying mammal with webbed feet and a broad bill, from Australia.

polo: a game in which two teams of four players on horseback use long mallets to hit a small ball.

pyramid: a building shaped like a triangle. Most pyramids were tombs or temple platforms.

quetzal: a type of bird with red and green feathers. The male has very long tail feathers.

rainforest: a tropical forest with high annual rainfall.

roadrunner: a small bird with brown or black feathers and a long tail. It runs quickly across the ground.

salamander: an amphibian that looks like a lizard but has soft, moist skin instead of scales.

saxophone: a brass wind instrument with keys for the fingers.

scrubland: an area covered with low trees and shrubs.

sea anemone: a sea animal with a tube-shaped body and circles of tentacles around its mouth.

sea fan: colorful coral with a flat, fanlike shape.

skink: a type of lizard with flat, overlapping, smooth scales.

skyscraper: a tall building usually used for offices.

sloth: a type of mammal with long legs, curved claws, and shaggy fur. It moves slowly and hangs upside down in trees.

squash: a game played by two people who use racquets to hit a small, rubber ball against the walls of an enclosed court.

stadium: a sports arena with tiers of seats for spectators.

stegosaurus: a plant-eating dinosaur with two rows of spines down its back and long, heavy spikes on its tail.

swamp: an area of wet, spongy land.

swift: a type of bird that is related to the hummingbird but looks like a swallow.

synagogue: a Jewish temple or place of worship.

synthesizer: an electronic instrument that can make a variety of sounds and imitate other instruments.

tamarin: a type of mammal that resembles a monkey with a long tail and silky fur.

tapir: a large animal that looks like a pig with a long snout and hooves.

Glossary

tarsier: a small mammal that resembles a monkey with large eyes and padded fingers and toes.

telegraph: a device that sends messages over long distances by using a code of electrical signals.

temple: a place for religious worship.

termite: a type of insect that eats wood and resembles an ant.

thorax: the part of an insect's body between its head and its abdomen.

titi: a small, red or gray monkey.

tomb: a place where a person is buried or a building that is a memorial to a dead person.

toucan: a brightly colored tropical bird with a large beak.

tower: a vertical part of a building that is much taller than the building around it, sometimes a prison or fortress.

triangle: a triangular percussion instrument that is struck with a metal rod.

triceratops: a plant-eating dinosaur with a short frill behind its head and three horns.

trombone: a brass wind instrument with a long, bent tube that slides back and forth to play different tones.

tuatara: a large reptile that looks like a lizard. It can live over 100 years.

tuba: a large, brass wind instrument that makes a deep sound. It has several valves to change the tones.

tundra: an extremely cold and dry area. Part of the soil is frozen all year.

tyrannosaurus: a large, meat-eating dinosaur that walked on two legs.

understory: the middle layer of trees in a rainforest.

violin: a string instrument with four strings that are played with a bow.

warm-blooded: animals, such as mammals, whose body temperatures must remain constant.

woodland: an area covered with trees, also called a forest.
